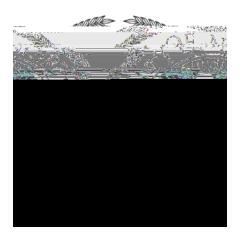

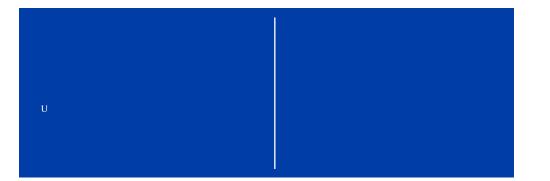

Special Item Request: \$30,000,000 HSC seeks State support to further expand our existing efforts and to seed new initiatives to address health disparities within Texas. Funding would be purposed to expand health disparity research and projects to benefit at-risk and underserved populations. Included in this request are funds to be used to add an African American cohort to our landmark Alzheimer's research that currently focuses on the Hispanic population.
